Message from the Headteacher, Mrs Bryson

It is exciting to write my first item for the newsletter as the new Head of St John's School and I have thoroughly enjoyed my first term here. There is so much to celebrate and all members of the school community should be very proud of their achievements.

I spent much of the first term "quietly" observing usual practice and absorbing the daily life of the school. I teach Drama twice a week to Year 7, deliver weekly assemblies to the whole school, frequently visit lessons and speak to students and have had a particular focus on the Sixth Form and how they develop independent study skills with our support. I have also met many parents, members of the community and held two SGC meetings. It has certainly been a busy term but one which has consolidated for me the true

family feeling and excellent ethos which exists in St John's School. Teachers and leaders work tirelessly to deliver bespoke, challenging yet supportive pathways for all students; students show amazing pride in their work, are polite and courteous and want to do well; parents too are very keen to support their children to succeed be it academically or socially: it really is a great place to be and a place to be great!



St. John's Nurture Hub



St John's has recently developed a new pastoral support area called the Nurture Hub. The Nurture Hub is designated for pastoral support area for all young people. We have created a relaxed, welcoming environment where young people feel safe and can talk things through with an experienced member of staff. We are open every break and lunch offering games club Monday, Wednesday and Friday lunchtime and mindfulness sessions Tuesday and Thursday breaks for all students.

Our one-to-one Emotional Literacy support work (ELSA) and Nurture Group are delivered in the Nurture Hub where we have collated a library of resources to support our young people on a range of topics such as self-esteem, friendships, mental health and social skills.

At St John's we believe that for our students to achieve academically we need to have an holistic approach and offer them the tools, advice and opportunities to develop emotionally as well.

The Nurture Hub is also supported at lunch times by the Sixth Form peer mentors, who offer a positive role model to the younger students and someone else to talk to if preferred.

Dave West Memorial

After Dave West's sudden and tragic death, I was approached by Cole Hughes, one of my sixth form students who wanted to produce a memorial. Cole was in the final term of A Level Art, so this was an extremely challenging task for someone who already had a demanding schedule. Tom Glencross, another student, also agreed to assist with this.

The inspiration for the piece came from the Brazilian mural artist Eduardo Kobra. He has painted over 30 large scale murals in over 20 countries, including the 60m high mural of David Bowie in New Jersey. Dave West had the ability to generate a smile and a laugh in any situation and it was felt that Eduardo Kobra's work projected this same element of fun and positivity.

Tom initially completed some preliminary drawings and the idea was originally for the whole piece to be drawn out onto a large circle of wood. Tom soon realised the challenges of trying to develop a large scale drawing of Dave's face that captured characteristics that he wanted to emphasise. It was decided at this stage to investigate the idea of using a large transfer of Dave's face over the top of a painted background. Tom spent considerable time editing and modifying an image of Dave's face on Photoshop, while Christos Christofi approached a local graphic design company to get the image printed on a large format transfer.

Rich Webster kindly cut the 180cm circular piece of wood, while Tom liaised with Lynne Everett regarding one of Dave's favourite quotes to include on the piece. The painting took considerably longer than anticipated, in part due to the sheer size of it. While Tom was responsible for the final design and painting, there were so many different people involved in ensuring that a fitting gesture became a reality. The final piece is now aptly displayed in the Sixth Form Common Room where Dave can continue to inspire students.








High Tides and Good Vibes

Educated at St. John's School, made in the Royal Air Force or Royal Navy?

Service visit from the RAF and Royal Navy on 25th

and 26th September 2019. The two UK-based education teams fully immersed themselves into school life by first delivering a whole school assembly to students and staff which gave an overview of their respective branches within the armed forces.

Following on from the assembly, students were offered the opportunity of taking recruitment selection tests for non-commissioned positions both as airmen and ratings. All participating students passed with flying colours and received individual feedback discussing trades that could be open to them.

These results are valid for 3 years and even if students decide not to pursue a military career, the psychometric tests provided useful practice of popular assessments procedures - often used in civilian recruitment practices as well.

The teams spent the break times chatting informally with the students - even challenging one or two enthusiastic pupils to some press-ups!

Finally, each team delivered a more detailed session within the PSHE programme to all the KS4 and KS5 students. This gave students the chance to interact more with the teams, ask questions and hold detailed discussions about life as part of the armed forces.

The trip was a great success and it has helped enthuse students to start thinking about and planning their own individual career pathways, be that within the Forces environment or not.

Robotics with the RAF

On Thursday the 3rd of October, an RAF STEM team from the UK came to St. John's and the theme was robotics. The leader of the STEM team was John who took us through the process of how to build a moving robot using Lego. We were in groups of twos or threes and we had to make our own version of the basic design John had shown us based around the main electric block which would help us code it later on. We were given two wires which we had to incorporate into the design and connect it to the electronic device in our Lego robot; this would give the code directions to the robot.

Then we had a 5 minute tutorial on how to do the coding using iPads. We then had 15 minutes to write all the coding on the app and connect it to our robot (which we got to name) then another 15 minutes to test the robot and see if it would move to our commands on the app. The reason for this was because we had to take part in a race against all the other teams and their robots. The race was from one line to the middle, turn 360 degrees and then carry onto the further line and return as fast as you could.


Finally we had to scrap the code we made and make a new code to play the game 'closest to the wall but not touching.' We only had 10 minutes to write and test it, then the game started but of course there could only be one winner.

Overall, it was a great experience and, even though it was 2 hours, the time flew by! The team who came over from the UK were amazing, friendly and very helpful; we hope to see them again soon.




'The world's too small for walls'

The fall of the Berlin Wall in November 1989 paved the way for German Unification barely a year later in October 1990. October 3rd is a National holiday in Germany known as German Unity Day (Tag der Deutschen Einheit), and celebrations are held throughout the country.

To honour this celebration, year 9 students and some staff from St. John's came to school dressed in German costumes.

Without CPR the chances of surviving cardiac arrest are zero.

Across the UK, there are over 30,000 cardiac arrests outside of hospital every year, but the survival rate is less than 1 in 10.

The Restart a Heart campaign (RSAH) is an annual initiative led by the Resuscitation Council (UK) in partnership with The British Heart Foundation, British Red Cross, St. John's Ambulance and Yorkshire Ambulance Service which aims to improve the low numbers of people surviving out-of-hospital cardiac arrests.

On and around Wednesday 16 October 2019, an alliance of organisations all over the world came together to increase public awareness of cardiac arrests and increase the number of people trained in life saving CPR by organising and facilitating training events.

2019 marked the 6th annual Restart a Heart campaign, the 2nd World annual Restart a Heart campaign (WRSAH) and on Thursday 10th October, St. John's School held their first!

Discourse markers, also known as linking words, linking phrases or sentence connectors, are used to make a sentence logically constructed, allowing for connections and turns between sentences and paragraphs.

Students are encouraged to familiarise themselves with discourse markers in preparation for examinations to ensure relationships between ideas can be correctly expressed or joined together.

Discourse markers can assist students to link together points which have been made and points which they will go on to say showing a deeper understanding of the topic.

These skills are invaluable in preparing for examinations.

A significant contribution was raised in support of the Poppy Appeal.






Spreading Christmas Cheer

1278 Euros was raised overall by St. John's which contributed to the collective amount raised on island. We couldn't have done any of it without the generous support and cooperation of families, students and staff!























Zoe - Deputy Head of Poseidon






