


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Attendance

Student attendance is **above 95%**, exceeding the national average.

Overall percentage attendance stands at 94.3%, which although slightly below our school improvement target, is much improved on last year, up by 5%. Our whole school attendance is significantly higher (+3.4%) than the national average for state-funded secondary schools. These figures show real promise that we can realise our target of 95% and exceed the national average. Our interventions to support excellent attendance will continue into the new term for students who are significantly below 95%. Thank you to everyone involved in promoting excellent school attendance, only achieved through effective partnerships between home and school.

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
Educational Offer

The educational offer is consistently 'Good', ensuring St John's School ranks in the Top 5% of schools nationally for student progress.


We continue to develop a culture of sharing best practice when it comes to developing our educational offer. Staff, irrespective of role, are taking the opportunity to visit one another's classroom, offering

feedback and transferring examples of best practice into their own teaching. Our non-negotiables launched at the beginning of this academic year are firmly embedded and assessment for learning strategies are common place in all lessons. Aided by a new complement of teachers in Maths, our provision continues to improve and our students are appreciative.

Since Christmas we recruited and launched our team of Lead Teachers who are being trained to coach and aid colleague reflection upon their teaching practice. I am delighted that our Lead Teacher initiative is being replicated across MOD Schools worldwide and it is acknowledgement that St John's



School is becoming a centre of best practice with much to share with schools elsewhere.



Looking ahead to next term, we have contracted an Educational Consultant to visit our school in June. As a trained and current OFSTED Inspector, the consultant will undertake a review of our school and our journey of improvement. Providing some external validation that, in turn, will be shared with all stakeholders, it is hoped that it will sharpen our whole school focus ahead of a requested OFSTED Inspection for March 2024.

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Student Mobility

St John's School is a centre of best practice; eliminating educational disadvantage caused by mobility.

Student progress exceeds 0.38

Students in Year 11 and 13 have just four school weeks left prior to the start of their final exams. The focus and commitment has been faultless. Last week we received the exam results of our BTEC Students who took exams in subjects like Sport, Health and Social Care and Travel and Tourism. Their exam results were outstanding, exceeding those of last year's cohort and evidencing a whole school trajectory of improvement in educational outcomes. We had a total of fifty grades returned as follows:

- 40% of our students secured a Pass
- 50% of our students secured a Merit
- 10% of our students secured a Distinction

The progress score calculates to be 0.61, exceeding our target of 0.38. Such an outcome is encouraging ahead of the upcoming final exam series.



As well as encouragement at Key Stage 5, our Year 11 students continue to evidence improvement in English and Maths with a 14% improvement in the number of students achieving a Grade 4 or above between December and March. We are currently on track to achieve a pass rate in English and Maths of 78%, a 10% improvement on last year. There is also reason to be optimistic for more and it is hoped that this figure may increase to 90% come the final exams in June.

Looking ahead to next term, once the final public exams finish, Year 10 and 12 will sit their end of year exams. These exams will be followed by the end of year Progress Tests for students in Year 7, 8 and 9.



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Student Satisfaction

As shared in October, our students possess an attitude towards their learning that exceeds that of all others nationally. This assessment was arrived at through the Pupil Attitude to Self and School Survey which took place in the first half term and makes comparison with students in England and Wales. We will be repeating this external assessment during the first week of the new term, allowing comparison and a further indication of what we must do to improve our student experience whilst they are in our care.

Mr Marsden has picked up the baton in leading our student focus groups. Student groups are compiled depending upon demographic in an effort to cross reference common themes as well as themes particular to a student group. The student groups have included those made up of students from Akrotiri, Episkopi, 1 Lancs, Civil Servants and ability to name a few.

As we move into the new term, Mr Marsden is to develop a strategy outlining our approach to student leadership. Historically it has been a bit ad hoc and lacked longevity, with an underpinning strategy this approach will be replaced with one that is coherent and offers ample opportunity for all to obtain the varying skills and qualities of a leader.

I am extremely proud to meet so many of you and showcase our school be it, as part of a tour, through the Headteacher's Surgery, Parent Forum, a Parent Afternoon and/or one of the many school events we have held. As we have moved through this term and into the next I will continue to seek opportunities that help to bring the school closer to Akrotiri. The fortnightly Headteacher Surgery based at the Akrotiri Hive is just one example and it is expected that we will be sharing an increasing number of our sporting extra curricular activities with Akrotiri, starting with Rugby next term. It is hoped that by doing so parents based in Akrotiri can share in watching their child train and compete.

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Mathematics Updates Summer Term

Year 7

Year 7 will be accessing an exciting new curriculum in Mathematics lessons from after Easter which focuses on depth of understanding of Mathematics.

This curriculum is widely used with great success in UK schools and we are very excited for our year seven students to have the opportunity to learn with Maths Mastery.

Year 8

Miss Fox will take over the teaching of 8Ma1 who have, until now, been taught by Mrs McKenna. Miss Fox is very much looking forward to working with Year 8 again.

Year 9

Year 9 completed their assessments and, as a team, we are very happy with their effort. They have been told about set changes in lessons and these will begin from after Easter. Students will start the GCSE content and work towards GCSE Statistics as well.

Year 10

Year 10 have recently completed an assessment and we are now working towards closing gaps in knowledge that have been highlighted from that test. Year 10 have around 43 school weeks until their external examinations.

Year 11

Year 11 mock exams were extremely positive and, as a year group, the results for the summer are looking promising.

Year 11 have 4 school weeks until their first Mathematics exam. Students need to ensure they are revising little and often using the 6 week revision plan. If they need a spare copy - they are on Google classroom.

Year 12

Year 12 will have a full set of AS papers as their mock exams so they need to be starting to revise the content from earlier in the year.

Year 13

Year 13 have now completed the vast majority of their A level course and need to start looking at the past papers given to them by teachers. The group are working extremely hard and we are excited to see how they do in the summer exams .
