

Our Values and Educational Offer

In a recent external school visit the understanding of our new school values and the students' articulation of them received praise. I have been both surprised and encouraged at the speed in which they have been adopted and utilised throughout daily life in our school. As mentioned in a previous newsletter edition, it is my ambition to embed our three values *Integrity, Commitment and Respect* into every aspect of school life. This ambition began with a community consultation that explored how our values underpin our educational offer.

Starting on our September Inset day, teachers considered the *principles* that are associated with our values and would go onto underpin school life. The students in year group assemblies then considered their *learning behaviours* needed to demonstrate our three values. Finally, the *pedagogy* needed to support our learners to adopt their identified learning behaviours, the three values and their identified principles were explored. The process has culminated in our *Pedagogy Wheel* that illustrates our whole school co-constructed approach to embedding our values and providing educational offer rooted in current educational research and best practice. Our Student Leadership Team will now use our wheel to identify the St John's School Student Charter, whilst I will work with colleagues to establish our St John's School Staff Charter

In this week's student article, Bobby in Y11 discusses the proposal to expand the number of teams allowed to participate in the FIFA World Cup.

Should the FIFA World Cup be Expanded to Include 48 Teams?

The debate around the changes to the FIFA World Cup has sparked intense conversations and controversy and it is crucial that we carefully examine both sides of the argument. So, let us dive into the reasons why the World Cup shouldn't and should be increased to 48 teams.

For each continent the number of teams that can qualify have been increased with:

AFC (Asia) – eight places (up from 4.5)

Caf (Africa) – nine places (up from 5)

Concacaf (North and Central America) – six places, of which three go to hosts (up from 3.5)

Conmebol (South America) – six places (up from 4.5)

OFC (Oceania) – one place (up from 0.5)

Uefa (Europe) – 16 places (up from 13)

How this format will work we're unsure of as it could present one of two possibilities: The first being a format of 16 groups of three. This has previously been tried during the 1982 World Cup with groups of three, where Austria had already qualified and Germany needed a win to qualify for the round of 16. With them playing against each other on the last match day, both teams could controversially qualify for the round of sixteen making it so that Algeria would be knocked out of the World Cup. This was changed to what we know today.

Option 2 is 12 groups of four, using a preliminary round against other teams who finished third to decide who goes to the round of 32. This is the best option as it's how the world cup has been played for over twenty years.

Firstly, allow me to present the case against expanding the World Cup. The tournament in its current format is a historical masterpiece being like this for over 20 years with the number of participating teams increasing over time. It began as 16 teams from 1930 to 1982 with an expansion to 24, then in 1998 it changed to what we know as 32 teams. The 32-team structure ensures a high level of competition and quality. It brings together the footballing talent from around the globe, providing us with the ultimate display of skill and sportsmanship. This brilliance could be lost if the World Cup is expanded to 48 nations. It could lead to matches with imbalanced teams and a lower overall standard of play, potentially compromising the integrity and excitement that fans have come to expect.

However, let us now explore why the World Cup should indeed be expanded to 48 teams. Football is a global phenomenon, uniting people across continents, cultures, and backgrounds. Expanding the tournament would offer more countries the opportunity to participate, therefore promoting diversity within the sport. It would enable nations with emerging footballing talent to showcase their abilities on the grandest stage, fostering growth and development within their domestic football structures.

Also, an expanded World Cup would enhance the tournament's global reach and economic impact. Football is not just a sport; it is an industry that drives economies and generates significant revenue. By including more teams, FIFA can tap into new markets, attracting larger audiences and increasing the tournament's commercial value. This would create new opportunities for sponsors, broadcasters, and businesses associated with the World Cup, injecting vitality into local economies and providing a boost to the sport as a whole.

On top of that, a larger World Cup would promote greater engagement and enthusiasm among fans. Imagine the passion and pride of a nation when they witness their team qualifying for the World Cup for the first time. It ignites a sense of unity and excitement, inspiring the next generation of footballers and fans. Expanding the tournament ensures that more nations have a chance to experience this remarkable journey, which ultimately strengthens the global football community.

However, in my own opinion, the increase from 32 teams to 48 teams is an unnecessary change as it's perfect the way it is. From my own experience watching the World Cups, it plays out well with its structure. With an increase from 64 matches to 104 matches I believe this format is used to make more money from the viewership of these games.

In conclusion, the decision to expand the World Cup to 48 teams requires careful consideration of both the advantages and potential drawbacks. While some argue that the current 32-team structure preserves the tournament's prestige and quality, others advocate for inclusivity, economic growth, and the promotion of football worldwide. It is up to FIFA and the footballing community to weigh these factors thoughtfully and make a decision that best aligns with the values and aspirations of the sport. Let us remember that the essence of the World Cup lies not just in the number of teams but in the joy, passion, and friendships it brings to billions around the globe.
