Dear Families,

As mentioned in previous newsletters, this week saw our school visited by an external educational consultant. The consultant is a former secondary Headteacher and an experienced and practicing Ofsted Inspector who has worked extensively with secondary schools in England. The purpose of the visit was to quality assure what is happening in lessons through lesson visits and subsequent conversations with students. Over 100 lesson parts were observed and 80 children were spoken to across the two day visit.



We will be provided with a visit report in due course, however ahead of this report our school has been reassured that we have a very accurate understanding of our areas of strength and improvement priorities. The consultant commented upon areas of excellent practice, which included safeguarding, student behaviour and exam outcomes. Suggested aspects to continue to pursue centre upon our educational offer by ensuring students are challenged to think harder and engage in planned collaboration and pupil discussion. These areas link to our Pedagogy Wheel and supporting strategy.

Elsewhere this week, our students supported the Student Leadership Team initiative to raise awareness around Breast Cancer with money raised to support Cancer Research. On Thursday we were visited by 'Never Such Innocence' that allowed students to participate in a variety of literacy workshops that aimed to provide our students with a voice on conflict.

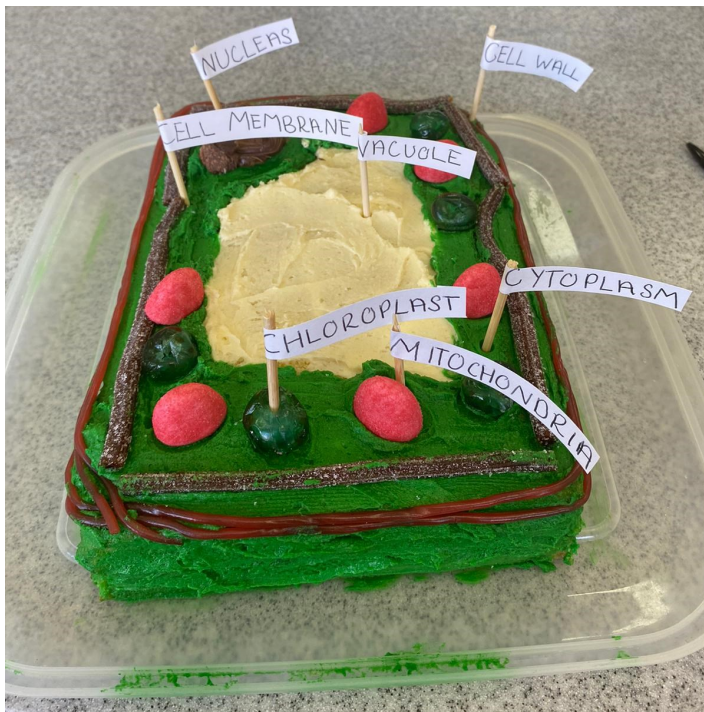

School Photographs

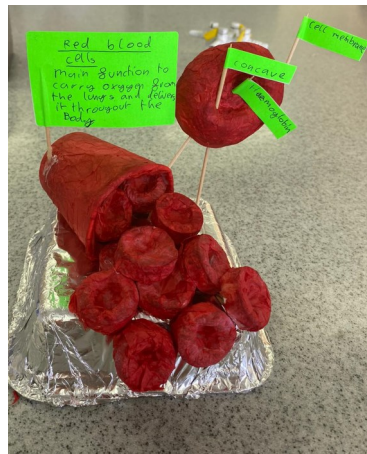
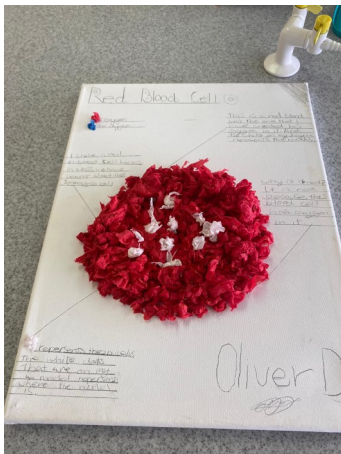
The proofs of our recent school photographs have arrived in school. Students will return home with the proofs of their photographs next week.

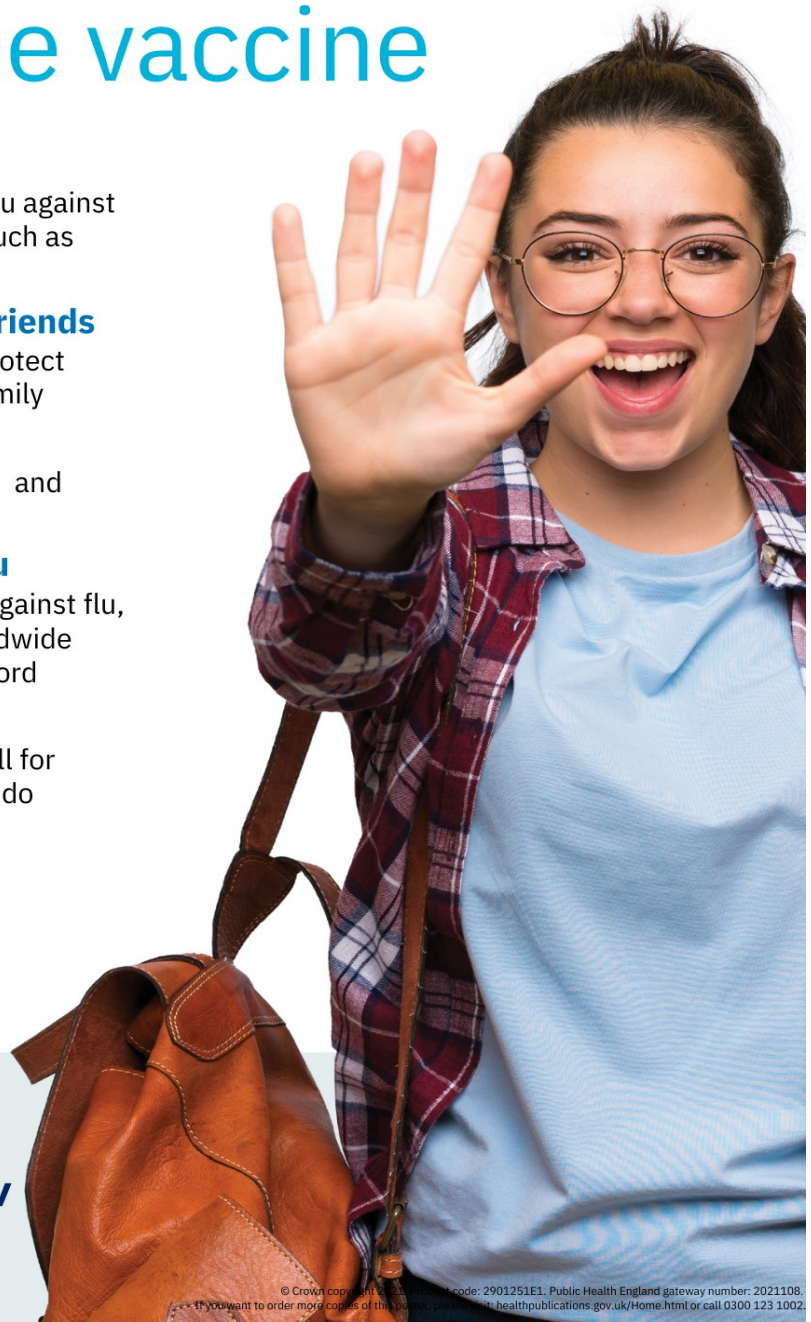

Why does Sherlock Holmes' dual nature make him such a great detective?

Sherlock Holmes' quiet, calm and introspective side is one of the reasons behind his great detective work. Dr Watson, one of Sherlock's companions, describes him to be in a 'poetic and contemplative mood' and in a state of 'extreme languor' (inactivity). This characteristic shows he is calm and peaceful and can take time to introspect: he can silently think to himself, being philosophical yet still logical. This is important for a detective because he needs to deduct the correct answer to a problem, however this needs focused thought as the first answer that comes to mind is most likely the wrong one. Detective work can be difficult, sometimes gruesome, which is a reason to calmly forget about the nasty thoughts of gore and puzzling detective work. Furthermore, the way he does this is by 'gently waving his long, thin fingers in time to the music'.

Mr Sherlock Holmes' energetic, detecting side is one of the reasons he is a great detective. Dr Watson describes him as 'the most perfect reasoning and observing machine'. This shows that he can observe down to the smallest detail, analysing his surroundings. In addition, he can theorise with his given facts to reason almost any problem. This is important for a detective as if there were an important detail to be overlooked, that would be a massive risk. Watson also describes him as a 'sleuth-hound', showing he is hasty to search using clues, using every piece of evidence with great energy. He can also be seen as sneaky; this is important for a detective as they need to be able to adopt a disguise and use it well. 'The lust of the chase' shows he enjoys putting criminals to justice and solving crime. This means he tries hard because he wants to try and catch criminals or solve problems that others couldn't by using his vast intellect, described as 'knowledge [that] was not of other mortals'. This compares his abilities to a god or someone of great power. Yet again, it is important for a detective to be intelligent, otherwise they may never be able to solve certain problems, crime or situations.
