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


Key Stage 3 Valentine School Disco



Year 11 produced some impressive literature essays in their December mocks and are now in the process of revisiting their English Language skills alongside regular retrieval practice based on their core literature texts.

Hot on Year 11's heels, having completed their initial study of war poetry, Year 10 are now approaching their first formally-assessed essay for the 19thcentury fiction component of the English Literature course.

This week's essay is a Year 10 practice assessment based on Charles Dickens' presentation of Scrooge's fears in 'A Christmas Carol'.

Explore how Dickens presents Scrooge's fears in 'A Christmas Carol'

Within Dickens' novella 'A Christmas Carol', he presents Scrooge's fears through the use of motifs such as light and darkness or warmth and coldness. Dickens also presents Scrooge's fears through the representation of other characters in the 1843 novella.

In Stave One, one of Scrooge's prominent fears is the fear of intimacy. When his nephew, Fred, comes to see him, Scrooge is very blunt and dry in his responses. He asks Fred why he got married and Fred replies that it was because he fell in love. Scrooge exclaims, sarcastically, repeating Fred's answer, 'Because you fell in love!" as he deems it an unacceptable answer. This could show that Scrooge does not believe in love, for he could be exclaiming in confusion. Also, the aggression in his outburst could reflect his offence at the word 'love'. This could be Scrooge trying to hide his vulnerability and fear. The fear of intimacy is also presented in Stave Two, with the representation of Scrooge's ex-partner, Belle. As Belle presents her issues within their relationship and Scrooge's changes in behaviour, Scrooge is confused and asks "What then?...I am not changed towards you." The question suggests his genuine confusion and deep-rooted denial. The formal language could perhaps infer his discomfort when discussing a topic of intimacy, further proving his fear. It could also show a slight fear of change, or not being in control. His statement might be a way for him to try and take back control of the situation.

The fear of losing control is also shown in Stave Two through Scrooge extinguishing the ghost. However, despite his attempts, "he could not hide the light, which streamed from under it". The 'light' could be a symbol of hope, or a symbol of change, which Scrooge shows he has a fear of when talking to Belle. The verb 'streamed' has connotations of running water. Water is clear, which might foreshadow Scrooge's changes and movement towards purity in the later staves.

Dickens, in Stave Three, shows Scrooge's fear of poverty through the two children, Ignorance and Want. The children are described as "yellow, meagre, ragged, scowling, wolfish". The adjective 'yellow' suggests malnourishment to the point where their skin is tainted. The verb 'scowling' suggests that they seem unfriendly towards Scrooge, perhaps because he is from a wealthier class. Finally, the adjective 'wolfish' compares the children to an animal, dehumanising them. It could also suggest that they look wild and feral to Scrooge. His reaction reflects this, for when he tries to speak, "the words choked themselves". The personification portrays Scrooge's fear because fear can feel like something pushing the air out of your lungs. This is also a stark contrast to Scrooge in previous staves, where he was quite quick-witted and vocal. This fear of poverty is carried through to Stave Four, when the beetling shop is in an "obscure part of town", showing how he is not familiar with this poorer area of town. This could mean that Scrooge is afraid of poverty because it is unknown to him.

Furthermore, Scrooge's fear of the unknown is portrayed through the extract via the description of his body language. For instance, at the arrival of the Ghost, Scrooge "bent down upon his knee" which is a sign of respect. It could suggest that Scrooge is willing to be in submission, rather than in control,

because the Ghost knows the future, whereas it is unknown to Scrooge (which he is afraid of). This also has religious connotations, as if Scrooge is bowing down to God, showing his repentance. This could also present a fear of damnation, despite no evidence of Scrooge being religious. Moreover, in anticipation of seeing the unknown, "His legs trembled". The verb 'trembled' means to shake uncontrollably, due to anxiety or fear. This shows that his fear of the unknown is more prominent than his fear of losing control, or that he has overcome that fear of losing control.

In conclusion, Dickens uses a combination of motifs, representation of other characters, and Scrooge's body language to present Scrooge's fears throughout the text. These convey Scrooge's true emotions, despite Dickens initially presenting his as a very closed-off person.
