

Year 10 have completed their initial reading of J.B. Priestley's 'An Inspector Calls' and are now focusing on developing their analytical skills. Here are two excellent essay responses from students based on the prompt question:

How does Priestley present Mr. Birling in Act 1 of 'An Inspector Calls'?

Throughout Act One of the play, Mr. Birling is presented as a pompous and obstinate man. Priestley used Mr. Birlings character throughout the act to personify the flawed ideology of capitalism, the ignorance of the older generation and the callous nature of the higher class within society. From the offset of Act One, Mr. Birling is seen to be holding court and resorts to name dropping: 'Finchley' I order to impress Gerald Croft, who is considered of a higher class to the Birling family. This implies that Mr. Birling relies heavily on his social status and is still trying to gain approval from those superior to him, suggesting he truly believes that being of high status is the best way to impress, again showing his ignorance. Mr. Birling is also seen to be self-absorbed, this is indicated when he is discussing Gerald and Sheila's engagement, when he states, 'this is one of the happiest nights of my life'. This alludes to the notion that Mr. Birling is so blinded by his need to climb the social ladder that he disregards Sheila's hand in marriage and is more concerned about improving his company and making more money. This also represents that Birling prioritizes money over his family and is focused heavily on himself and how others see him.

Furthermore, Priestley uses a myriad of dramatic irony in Mr. Birlings speeches. This could suggest that Priestley is mocking the ruling class and their ignorance regarding issues that truly matter. This is further shown when Birling voices that 'Germans don't want war' and 'the titanic is unsinkable'. Adding to this, these suggestions made by Birling would upset the 1945 audience who would have lived through both world wars, allowing the audience to sympathies with him and understand his views. The use of a political diatribe is shown throughout the play, shown via a capitalist view shows Priestley's feelings on the matter to be negative. Throughout Mr Birlings speech this can be shown as Birling repeatedly explains how 'a man' must do all the hard work and 'look after himself' to get to a good place encapsulating his mass amount of anger about the situation, expressing aggression through his tone and choice of vocabulary. This is likely because this is what Birling had to do to reach the place he is at now as he was described as 'provincial in this speech' potentially showing a lack of sophistication. These views are likely as he had to work extremely hard for his money and therefore does not want to lose it, or that he wants to make more money showing his greedy characteristic and that he is not willing to share. This is further backed up by Birling not wanting to share or work with others getting 'mixed up like bees in a hive'. This simile shows his belief that if this happened it would be chaotic like a hive with bees all around. The phrase 'mixed up' again exposes Mr Birlings views on the lower class and upper class being equal (socialism). The verb mixed alludes to the idea that the two classes do not combine naturally.

How does Priestley present Mr. Birling in Act 1 of 'An Inspector Calls'?

Within Act 1, Priestley presents Birling to have a patriarchal attitude towards both his business and family. During the Edwardian time of which, 'Inspector Calls' is set, the male dominant society is seen to heavily influence Birlings views and opinions on life especially when it comes to business. This is shown by his belief that, "a man has to make his own way in life". The emphasis on the noun "man" shows his narrow minded views and beliefs in female inferiority, followed by "make his own way". This shows Birling's personal self-absorption, inferring his own successes and personal growth is all that matters rather than being supportive of others achievements. Moreover, Priestley continues to convince the audience that Birling is misogynistic by introducing his character as a, "hard-headed, practical man", this not only uses repetition of "man" but reassures us Birlings yet to be made comments are not just occasional, but instead frequent, which leads us to believe antisocial behaviour is quite common for him as a character.

Furthermore, Priestley shows Birling to have arrogant and ignorant attributes, alongside absolutist views. Birling's strong-minded views contradict the future, "The titanic unsinkable absolutely unsinkable" not only does this statement foreshadow the sinking of the Titanic later that year, but also creates dramatic irony due to the ship being produced through capitalism. Birling, being a clear capitalist this is seen as ironic and as if he is only supporting the ship due to the shared belief of capitalism with its creators. Priestley also creates Birling to seem the arrogant type by making long speeches about his predictions for the future, not just about the Titanic. Birling also shows ignorance by referring to a group of young boys as, "you" instead of seeing them as individuals, therefore belittles their characters.

Alongside the arrogance and ignorance, Priestley also depicts Birling to be a selfish character. We, as the reader, see Birling to have this trait from the beginning and we are able to see his lack of compassion for those other than himself. He does however state to care about his "family and business" making it clear that he has no empathy for "community and all that nonsense". This also highlights Birling's capitalist approach as mentioned throughout the play, and although capitalism was a common view during these times you would like to assume he would have some care towards others due to him owning high end businesses of which many people are described to have used. His selfish nature is also shown through his work, and is reinforced by him wanting to see "lower costs" and "higher prices" which would result in him increasing his profit whilst keeping those in his "workforce" as submissive. Priestley shows that his craving of profit is all that matters to him and by him enabling the capitalists to profit rather than the majority is what keeps him content.

To conclude, Priestley conveys Birling to be patriarchal and overall arrogant. Birling's capitalist principles are orchestrated throughout the entirety of Act 1, demonstrating him to be an egotistical character.
