This year our school show, Grease, took to the stage after months of rehearsals. We hope you had opportunity to watch this spectacle and enjoyed it as much as the students did in performing.

















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
















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Duke of Edinburgh

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Easter Revision and Exam Preparation

For most of our students the Easter Break presents a welcome break from study, however for students in Year 11 and 13 the Easter Break presents an opportunity to reshape their revision programme and commit to an extended period of independent study. This period will be rewarded with an extended Summer Break, but there is a need for students to continue their study ahead of their final exams which will commence on the third week of the Summer Term.

Students in both Year 11 and 13 should look to spend approximately 2—2.5hrs a day revising in 30 minute chunks. This commitment should afford days off and involve a wide variety of revision activities. These activities are likely to centre around (but not exclusively) the practice of past exam questions, which can be done with notes and revision guides. As the Easter holidays roll on, the use of notes should be reduced and a shift made towards answering past questions under timed and exam conditions.

The approach to revision should be timetabled and parents are encouraged to discuss with their child what they have revised and how they are progressing. Each students timetable will be individual to them and for students in Year 11 it should plan for a greater amount of time studying for English, Maths and Science.
