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School Uniform Changes

Earlier this week a letter was shared with parents detailing changes to our school uniform. As explained in the letter changes to our uniform will begin to take effect in September 2026 and students will not be expected to comply fully to the new school uniform until September 2027. A copy of this letter can be found on our Facebook page.

Why are we making changes?

We have consulted with stakeholders extensively over the past 18 months during which we were told:

- there is peer pressure to ensure the school skirt is short in length
- the skirt procured by the school is often ill-fitting, requiring it to be rolled around the waist to prevent it from being loose fitting
- that our girls feel uncomfortable moving around the school site, particularly upstairs
- by parents that some items of uniform generate unnecessary expense by mandating logos or limiting where items maybe purchased e.g. logoed PE shirt (€15) and the tartan skirt (€15).
- that the beige shorts are difficult to source, show dirt and are difficult to keep clean
- by the wider WSBA community that the length of skirt worn by students is inappropriate as an item of uniform and risks sexualising our students
- by teaching staff that by persistently challenging students around uniform risks positive teacherstudent relationships.

Why make the changes now?

Summer 2026 is a period of high transition for our student population. We have timed the change to ensure students arriving in September 2026 can procure new items of uniform that will last the duration of their time with us. We have phased in the uniform changes over two years to ensure parents are able to extract good value for money out of the items already purchased and being worn. For students already enrolled at St John's School they will be able to continue to wear existing items of uniform up to July 2027.

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Year 11 and 13 Parents' Afternoon



Why Kindness Matters in the Classroom

At St John's we believe that developing strong learning behaviours is just as important as academic progress. During this time, children explore what the chosen characteristic means, why it matters, and how they can show it in their everyday school life.

At the end of each cycle, pupils who have demonstrated that learning behaviour particularly well will be recognised with a Quick Note of **Integrity, Respect, or Commitment**. These notes are a way of celebrating the values that underpin learning and community life at St John's.

For the next two weeks, our focus is on Kindness.

Kindness is more than simply being polite – it creates the right environment for everyone to learn and flourish. A kind word can give a classmate confidence to try something new, and a thoughtful gesture can help someone overcome a difficult moment. In classrooms, kindness might look like:


- Encouraging a partner when the work feels tricky.
- Listening carefully and valuing others' ideas.
- Sharing resources or taking turns fairly.

Speaking to others in a respectful and supportive way.

When kindness is part of everyday learning, children feel safer to take risks, make mistakes, and grow. It strengthens friendships, builds resilience, and helps everyone feel they belong.

Bring in a Reading Book



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Nut Free School

As you will likely be aware, a significant number of our staff, students and visitors have a severe allergic reaction to nuts and peanuts. Severe allergic reactions result in anaphylaxis.

Nuts and Peanuts can cause severe allergic reactions in a wide range of ways. A person with an allergy does not have to eat nuts or peanuts to have a severe reaction, this can be caused by surface contact and airborne particles. This allergy effects approximately 1/50 children and adults.



In recent years we have seen a sharp increase in snacks containing peanuts and a rise in the use of peanut butter in sandwiches.

As a school we have a responsibility to keep our students, staff and visitors safe and to reduce risk of harm. As you can imagine in a busy school environment this can be a challenge and, following consideration, we feel the only way to protect those students is by removing the allergens from the school.

What this will mean?

- Peanut and nut based products will no longer be sold in the canteen.
- Students, staff and visitors will not be able to bring products containing nuts or peanuts into school.

Items that are found to break this rule will be confiscated and disposed of safely.

What products will not be allowed in school?

- Peanuts and nuts and products containing peanuts or nuts.
- Peanut butter or peanut based chocolate snacks (Snickers/ Reece's pieces etc).
- Items where peanuts or nuts are listed as main ingredients.
- Nut or peanut based oils or products.

What products are allowed?

• Items that "may contain nuts" and "may contain traces of nuts" or "made in factories that use nuts" These present a low risk and are not direct ingredients in the products.
