

The Learning Circle at St John's School

Decisions that Shape Success

We believe that every lesson is not just about learning subjects, but also about learning how to make good decisions. **Making the Right Choices** in the Classroom is an important part of helping our students grow into responsible, independent young people.

So, what does it mean in practice? It's about students thinking before they act, weighing up the consequences, and choosing the option that supports their own learning—and the learning of others.

Examples of Making the Right Choices include:

- Staying focused when there are distractions around.
- Listening carefully when a teacher or classmate is speaking.
- Asking for help if something is unclear, rather than giving up.
- Choosing kindness in their words and actions, even in tricky moments.

Owning up to mistakes and working to put them right. How students can show it day to day:

- Coming prepared with the right equipment and a positive attitude.
- Following instructions the first time, showing respect for the learning environment.
- Encouraging others to stay on task instead of joining in with off-task behaviour.
- Taking pride in their work by giving their best effort.

Reflecting on their choices at the end of a lesson and considering how they can improve next time. When students consistently make the right choices classrooms become calmer, more productive places where everyone can succeed. Parents can support this at home by talking with their child about daily decisions—big or small—and celebrating when they've made a positive choice.

Reflection question for families to consider together:

"Can you think of one choice you made today that you're proud of, and why?"

<u>St John's Aspire Programme – Half Term Review</u>

This half term marks an exciting milestone as our very first cohort of *Aspire* students have completed the opening chapter of their journey. The Aspire Programme was launched to stretch and challenge our most committed and aspirant Year 8 students, both academically and personally, and it's safe to say they've risen to the challenge brilliantly.

From the very first week, the group threw themselves into STEM based teambuilding activities, developing their problem solving and collaboration skills while having plenty of fun along the way. They've also been getting to grips with conversational Greek; an impressive skill that's helping them connect with the local culture and build confidence in language learning.

The students have now begun work on their Foundation Project Qualifications (FPQ), taking ownership of their independent research and exploring topics they're genuinely passionate about. Their focus, curiosity, and commitment to learning have been truly inspiring.

Alongside this, Aspire students have engaged in structured debates, learning how to build strong arguments, think critically, and express themselves with confidence and clarity. They've also explored valuable study skills and the science of *metacognition* - learning how they learn best, and how to apply that knowledge to every subject.

It's been a fantastic start, full of energy, creativity, and ambition. We're incredibly proud of what the Aspire students have achieved so far and can't wait to see what they'll accomplish next half term. Greek and FPQ will continue - but they will look at Mathematics and Criminology - very exciting





School photographs will be taken on Wednesday 5th and Thursday 6th November. All students will be involved in having a whole school and year group photograph taken across these dates.






